NOTES: Education Classes - If you plan to buddy or observe a program it would be a good idea to let the coordinator know so he/she can call you in case of a cancellation. abne POSITIVE ATTITUDE


Attitude is contagious; would someone want yours?

Armand Bayou

Armand Bayou begins as a small, freshwater stream fed by run-off from its watershed in southeast Harris County. The waters of Armand Bayou meander some 13-river miles to Clear Lake, a back bay of Galveston Bay. As the bayou nears Clear Lake, it is increasingly influenced by tides and fresh water mixes with saltier water from the bay to form a **brackish** water estuary. The bayou has sluggish appearance because its below-sea-level channel allows water to flow slowly in both directions depending on the tide and more importantly, on the wind direction. The partially submerged trees seen throughout the bayou indicate subsidence of the banks due to the pumping of ground water for drinking and industry.

Armand Bayou's natural channel, vegetated banks and shallow water habitat, provides excellent nursery ground from many species of marine fish and invertebrates. The sluggish water traps nutrients and provides for a double food chain driven by both **phytoplankton** (microscopic algae) and **detritus** (decaying plant material). Throughout the year, water level and water color fluctuate from green in the summer to brown in spring and fall, while winter's nutrient-poor conditions cause the bayou to be clear and cold. Hurricane storm surges or flash floods can swell the bayou over its banks, mixing the nutritious silt and sediment particles into the otherwise thick, day soil. Thousands of years of this activity have created a soil type suitable for forest growth. In winter, fronts push all the water down into the channels revealing expansive mud flats.

Despite these widely changing conditions, animals in the estuary adapt and survive. The young of many fish species migrate into the bayou in spring and grow through the summer months by feeding on the rich sources of worms, crabs, clams and shrimp found on the bayou's productive mud and sand bottom. Year-round residents of the bayou like the sheepshead minnow, gulf killifish and sailfin molly live among the marsh grasses and shallows feeding on mosquito larvae and small crustaceans called amphipods. They, in turn, are fed upon by the larger, commercially important species like flounder, speckled trout, and redfish. Nearly forty species of fish and invertebrates make their homes in Armand Bayou. The most visible to casual onlookers are the striped mullet, which will often leave the water to leap several feet into the air. This behavior may be an escape response from predators such s the alligator gar. Gars can be seen laying on or rolling near the water's surface. These two species comprise most of the biomass of fish, especially in the summer. Learning the inhabitants of the bayou is a fun and challenging hobby for many nature center volunteers. Special training sessions are given specifically for that purpose.

Armand Bayou is a scenic, productive and fragile environment. Real estate development in this area has led to excessive nutrient loading of Armand Bayou causing algal blooms, which can lead to low dissolved oxygen levels. Small amounts of pesticides and industrial run-off can e accumulated over long times in fish, shellfish, and birds. Like many other Texas estuaries, Armand Bayou faces the detrimental effects of coastal development.
