abnc volunteer MEETING MINUTES

from meeting on March 14, 2002

The guest speaker was Don Richardson, who gave a lecture on Bird Migration. Immediately following the presentation, **Chairman Stan Krauhs** opened the business portion of the meeting.

Ken Russell (Treasurer) announced that the proposed **2002 Volunteer Budget** will be published in the upcoming issue of the Bayou Foliage and will be voted on during the April meeting.

A question was raised about policy regarding expenditures in excess of budgeted amounts and spending for unbudgeted items. These situations are not covered in the Volunteer Bylaws. Stan suggested that this should be addressed by a Bylaw Review Committee to be formed soon. Other issues already identified for the committee include audit procedures and roster updating.

Jim Callan (Stewardship) reviewed upcoming Stewardship events. They are:

March 16-Prairie grass planting (using grass harvested from a Pasadena construction site)

March 23-**Trash Bash** (Report to Bay Area Park at 8:30 AM)

April 20-Earth Day

April 27-Marsh Mania

Jim also mentioned that the 5 Star Grant had enabled interpretive signs to be placed on the prairie platform. The **Reconnecting by Canoe** grant has been awarded, and it will provide for a floating canoe launch at Bay Area Park, coastal preserve signs, a web site for paddlers, and the first annual Armand Bayou Coastal Preserve

Day.

Odie Asscherick reported that Mark Kramer needs **extra trail guides** for Earth Day, April 20.

Polly Swordlin gave an update for **Down on the Farm**. The sign-up list is in good shape, but there are still some openings. Farm clothing, such as overalls, are encouraged. Set-up will be on Friday, March 22.

Linda Sumner (Staff) reported the following items:

March 16 is the last day of the **Volunteer Training Class**. The Volunteer Board will provide breakfast and will answer questions and provide information to help the new volunteers to get involved quickly.

Video tapes of farm skill training, such as rope making, have been made and should be available soon for volunteer use.

Planning for the Exxon-Mobil picnic event is continuing.

CCISD is allowing ABNC flyers to be distributed. Some 25,000 will be made available, featuring Eco Camp and Earth Day.

The **volunteer roster** is being updated. Additional information, including initial training date and e-mail address is requested.

Blood donations are requested for Ed Adam's son.

Joe Clem has been named **Volunteer of the Month**. Joe has provided outstanding support over a long period of time. His most recent contributions include building the widgeon grass display cabinet and refinishing the farm house rocking chairs. He is currently

leading the team in putting a new roof on the farm house tool shed.

Unfinished Business:

The food and drink sign-up list for volunteer meetings is kept in the Volunteer Office. This is a group responsibility, since no single person is assigned to check it and follow up. If no one signs up, then simply no refreshments will be available at the meetings.

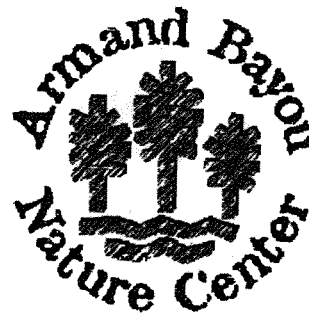

He thought he "hit pay dirt" when he took early retirement, but his wife and three teenaged children encouraged him to still work and earn a little income. Ken found out about the position while working on the Nature Center's telescope. He is an avid amateur astronomer and serves as Vice President of the Johnson Space Center Astronomy Society. "NET" WORKING

The ABNC Staff extends a big THANK YOU to the volunteers for funding new insect and aquatic net replacement bags. After just one year, many of the nets needed mending and replacement. That was all made possible by the volunteers. Thank you for your help and financial support.

WHAT ARE THOSE PINK FLAGS FOR?

The Prairie Friday Folks have been hard at work rescuing prairie plants from a nearby relic coastal prairie that is destined for development. The pink flags you see along the driveway mark individual shiny leaf coneflowers (*Rudbeckia texana*) and rattlesnake master (*Eryngium yuccifolium*). Watch for their blooms later this year.

We have also planted coneflowers, rattlesnake master, and leather flower (*Clematis crispa*) along the prairie trail and in front of the prairie platform. We targeted high-visibility areas for these showy plants to draw visitors' attention to the diversity and beauty of the prairie.

In addition to these flowers, we have also transplanted a few buttonbush

flatsedge (*Cyperus cephalanthus*), a wetland plant known to exist in only three places, one American aloe (*Manfreda virginica*), several Blue star (*Amsonia tabernaemontana*), and we have 51 pots of prairie cordgrass (*Spartina pectinata*), a prairie grass that is extremely rare in Texas, ready to go into the prairie. We have transplanted nearly 700 plants to date. (Candy, Carolyn, James and Jim did a dozen each, and Dick did the other 650...just kidding, but sometimes it did seem that way. You're our hero, Dick.)

WINTER BURN SEASON

Burn volunteers helped complete the most successful winter burn season in ABNC history. A total of 13 separate units were safely burned. The area of prairie requiring the use of prescribed burns has increased due to the successful removal of invasive Chinese tallow from much of the prairie landscape.

Several of the burn units handled the first prescribed fire in modern times. A total of 251 acres were burned during the winter burn season, more than has ever been burned in a winter season.

Thanks to the 61 trained burn volunteers who made this such a successful season. If you're interested in joining the team, the next training for burn volunteers will be held in June. Don't forget to visit to prairie platform this spring and enjoy the view.

Program: Mushroom Hunting, Identification and Tasting

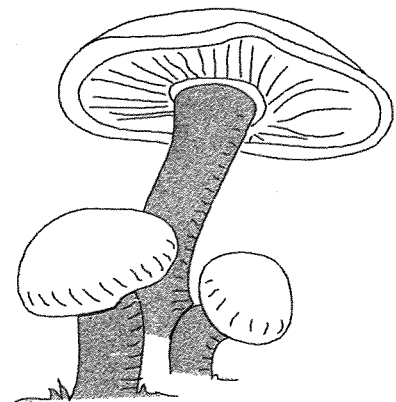
When: Saturday, April 27, 10:00 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.
