New Business:

2003 Budget Item—Volunteer Gift to ABNC (Stan Krauhs)

A list of 11 suggested items with cost estimates was presented. A vote of those present decided that a specific item should be purchased rather than to simply provide a cash gift to the Nature Center. Stan reported that a review of the current balance and expected revenues in 2003 after allowing an adequate safety margin would permit a maximum gift of \$2500. There was a suggestion from the floor to (cont. on page 3)

New Business continued:

set the gift at some maximum
percentage and another suggestion to
limit it to \$1000. No set percentage
or maximum amount was voted on. A
vote was taken of those present to
establish a priority of the listed items.
The item with the highest vote count
was a flat bed trailer (estimated at
\$1200-\$1500) for prairie burns to
replace the obsolete fire truck. Close

behind was signage for a proposed prairie trail (\$400-\$800). These were followed by a replacement white board by the admissions counter (\$100), volunteer brochures (\$200), scholarships to winter camp (\$80), and putting a concrete floor in one of the bays of the maintenance building (\$800-\$1100). These points will be given consideration in preparation of the 2003 Budget, to be printed in the

December issue of the Bayou Foliage and voted on at the December volunteer meeting.

Stan adjourned the business meeting at 8:05 PM.

got muck in your BOOTS?

november PROGRAM



Do you long for those muddy moments of finding swamp critters in your boots? Would you like to breathe in fresh bayou air while wrestling marsh plants out of ankle-deep muck? Well, you're in luck! It is time to jump in the bayou for the stewardship department!

We are implementing a grant, partly funded by Texas Parks and Wildlife, that involves collecting marsh plants such as California

bulrush, swamp lily, and black needle rush. Two temporary nursery ponds (50' by 10') will be constructed next to the Admissions Building to hold these plants after they are potted, allowing us to control their growth by excluding wave energy, herbivorous pests, and invasive species. Our hope is for these plants to create well-established root masses, which will enhance their survival rate once they are transplanted back into Armand Bayou next spring during Marsh Mania. Please contact Mark if you are interested in getting down and dirty for marsh habitat restoration!

By the time you receive this newsletter, we will have just a few days to go! Veterans of Fall Festival know the drill, but here's the final list to consider for this year's main event.


SIGN-IN PROCEDURES: When you arrive ready for "duty," no matter what time of day it is, please check in at the information booth. The information booth will be alongside the birthing barn, in sight of the farmhouse and windmill.

DRESS: Anything from 1900 to 1915 will be very nice to see around the grounds. If you don't have a costume, please wear your khaki shirt. Everyone should also wear a name tag.

It will not matter


What kind of car I drove,



prescribed prairie burn CLASS

When: Saturday, December 7 from 10 a.m. to 2:00 p.m.

Where: Meet in Education Building

Current Balance:

The class will focus on the use of prescribed fire to maintain the prairie at the Nature Center. Topics to be discussed include fire ecology, fire behavior, burning techniques, safety, equipment use, and governing laws. If conditions are favorable, a small plot will be burned to demonstrate this activity. Please wear appropriate clothing, that is, cotton shirt and long pants, boots, hat, bandana, and work gloves. This class is required before a volunteer can participate in a prairie burn. If you have not attended a previous class and want to participate in a future prairie burn, then you must attend. Please sign up on the class activity sheet in the volunteer office or call the front desk to be registered.

Did You Know?

Deer are most active just before sunset and again just after sunrise. During the middle part of the day they are generally bedded down, which provides a means of concealment. In North America, the White-tailed Deer shed their antlers from January

through March. New ones begin to grow in April and May and the velvet is lost in August or September. Other interesting facts:

Description: A graceful and dainty deer, with a long, slender neck and narrow face. May reach a height of three and a half feet at the shoulder and an extra large male may weigh 350 pounds! In the summer the coat is reddish brown and in the winter it is gray-brown. The underside of the tail is completely white.

Diet: In the wild, typical foods include grasses, weeds, acorns, fruits, leaves and grain. Deer are primarily grazers. Habitat: White-tailed deer prefer areas with enough vegetation for concealment. Brushy or wooded country is optimum.

Reproduction: Mating takes place between November and December and gestation is around 7 months. During this period, males are territorial and will attack anything that they view as a threat to their territory, including humans.




abnc volunteer DUTY ROSTER
